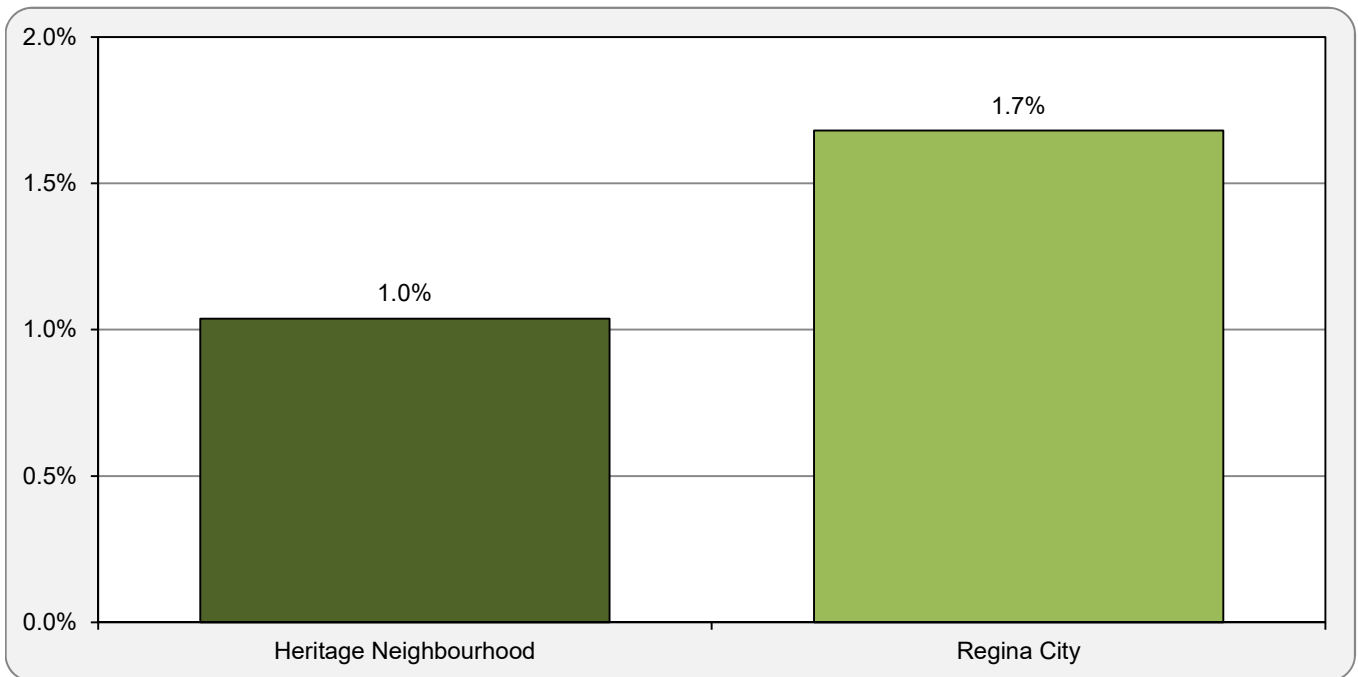
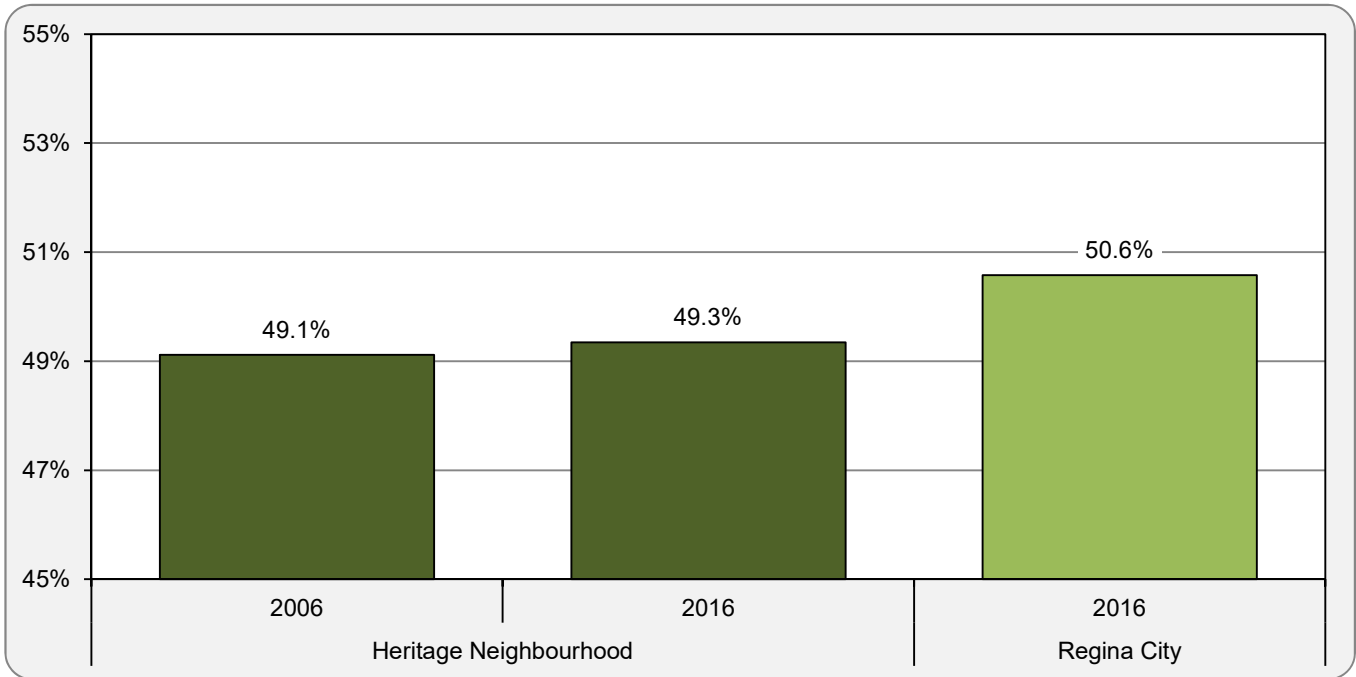

Statistical Profile of Heritage Neighbourhood

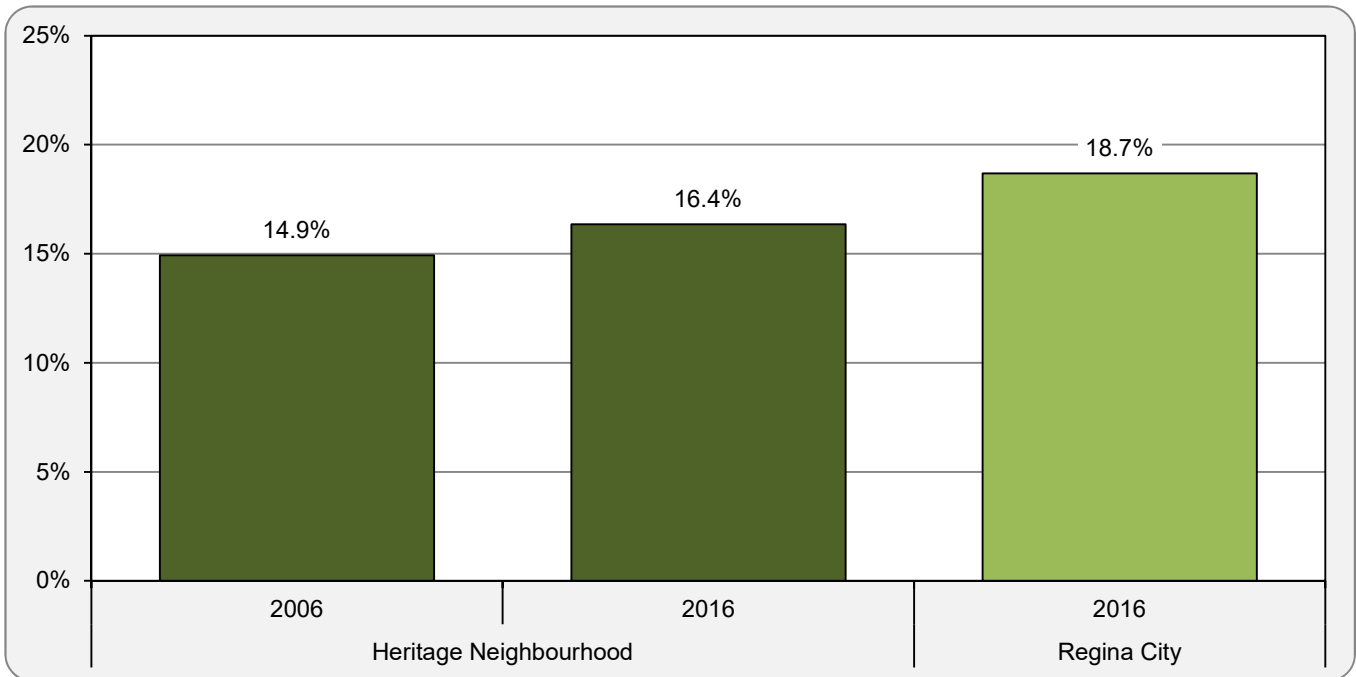

Figure 1: Women as Percentage of the Population

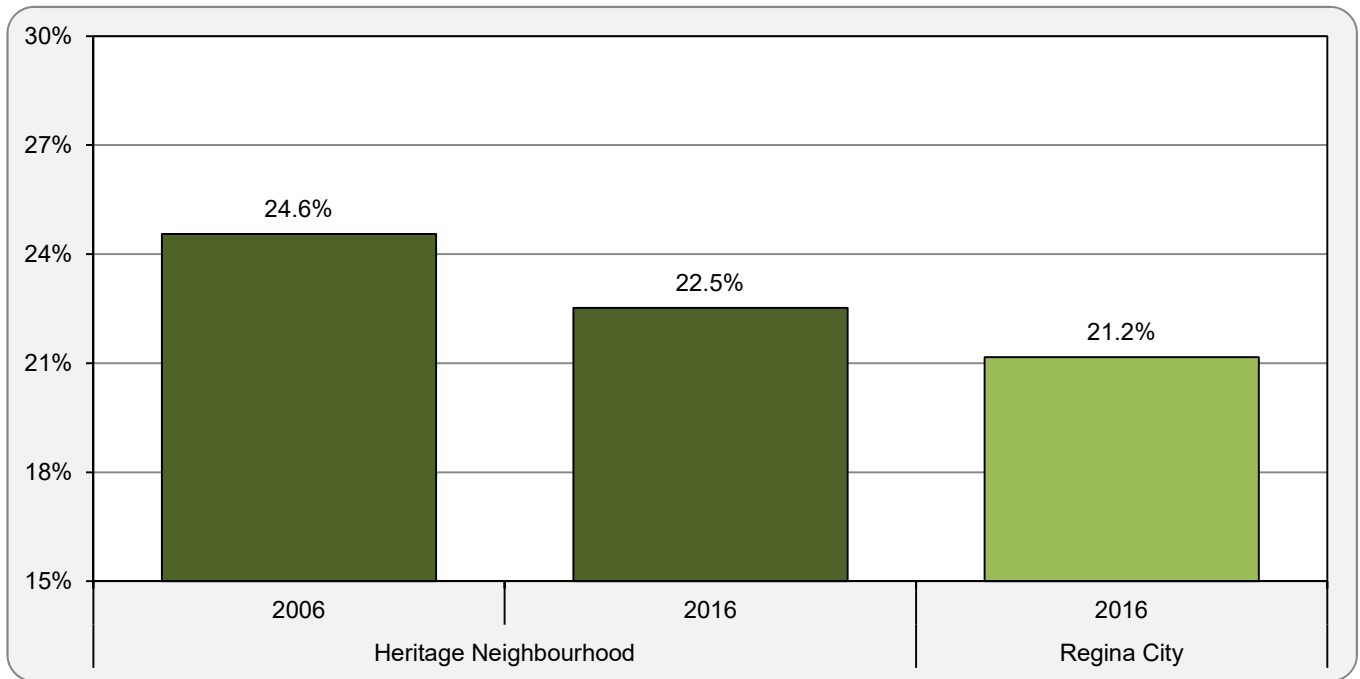

Figure 2: Children (under 15 years) as Percentage of the Population



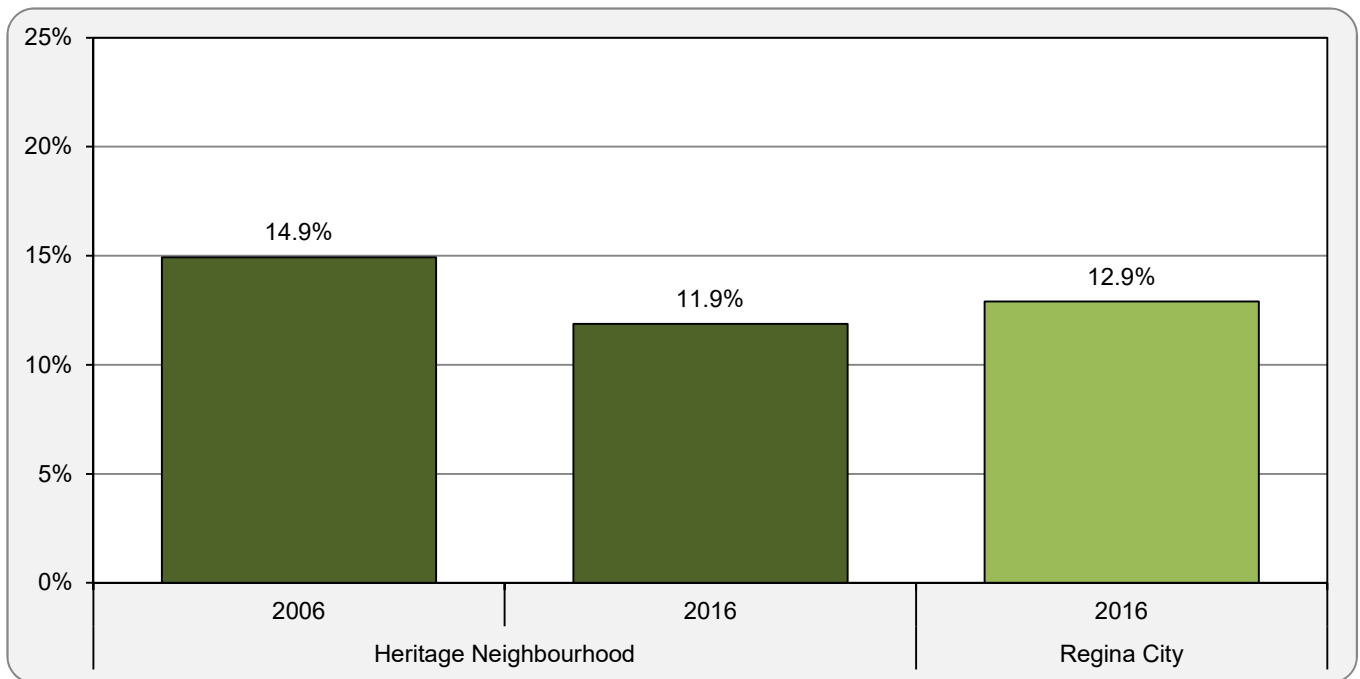

Figure 3: Young Adults (15 to 29 years) as Percentage of the Population

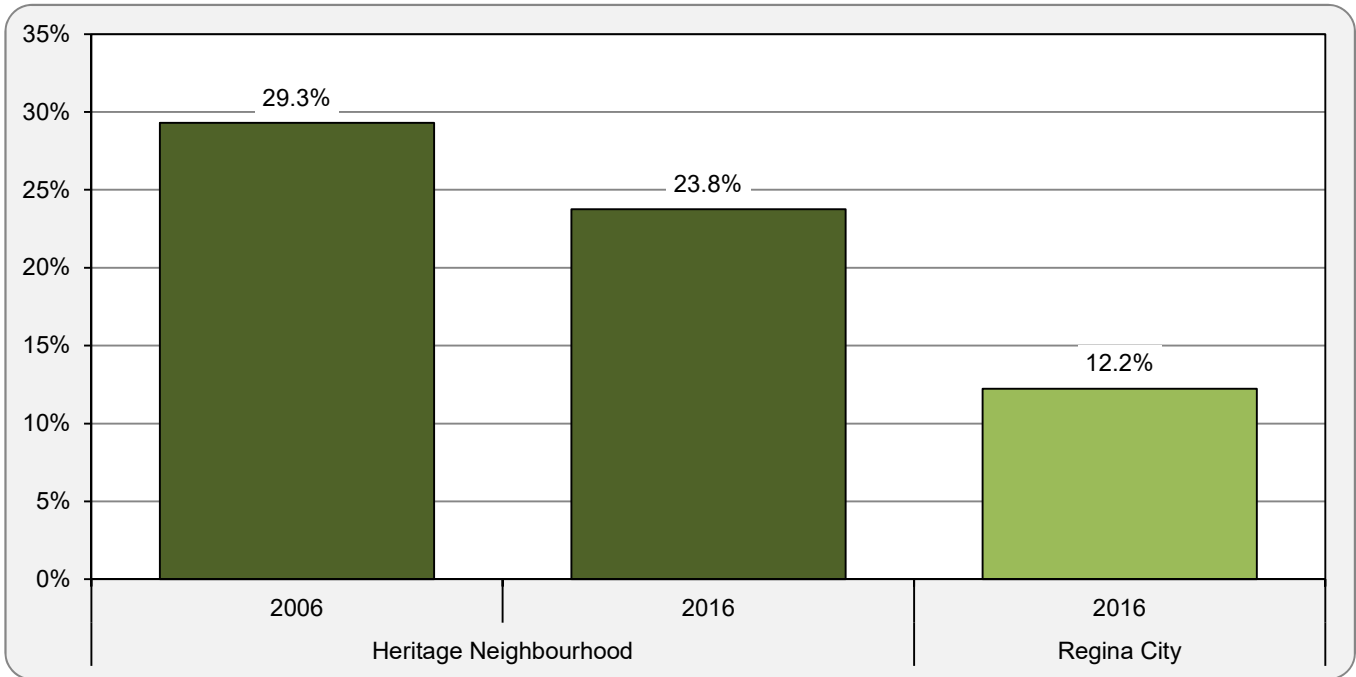

Figure 4: Seniors (65 years and older) as Percentage of the Population



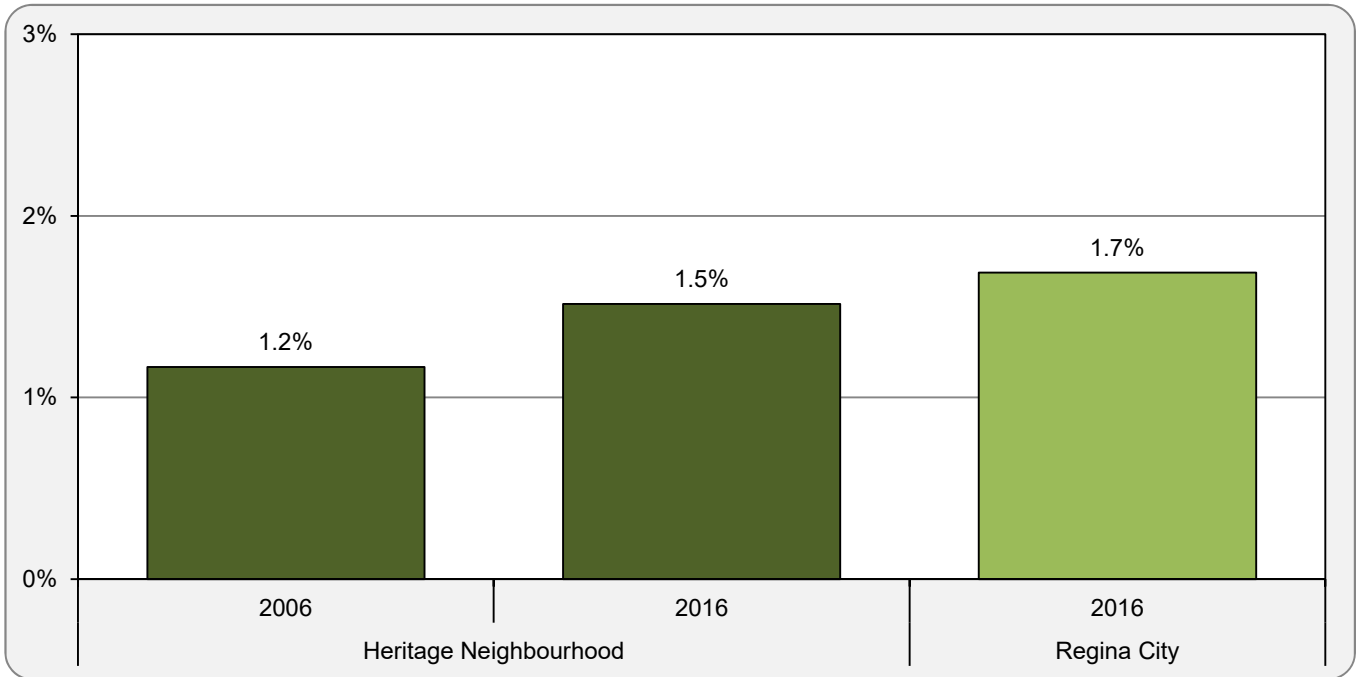

Figure 6: Lone-Parent Families as Percentage of all Families



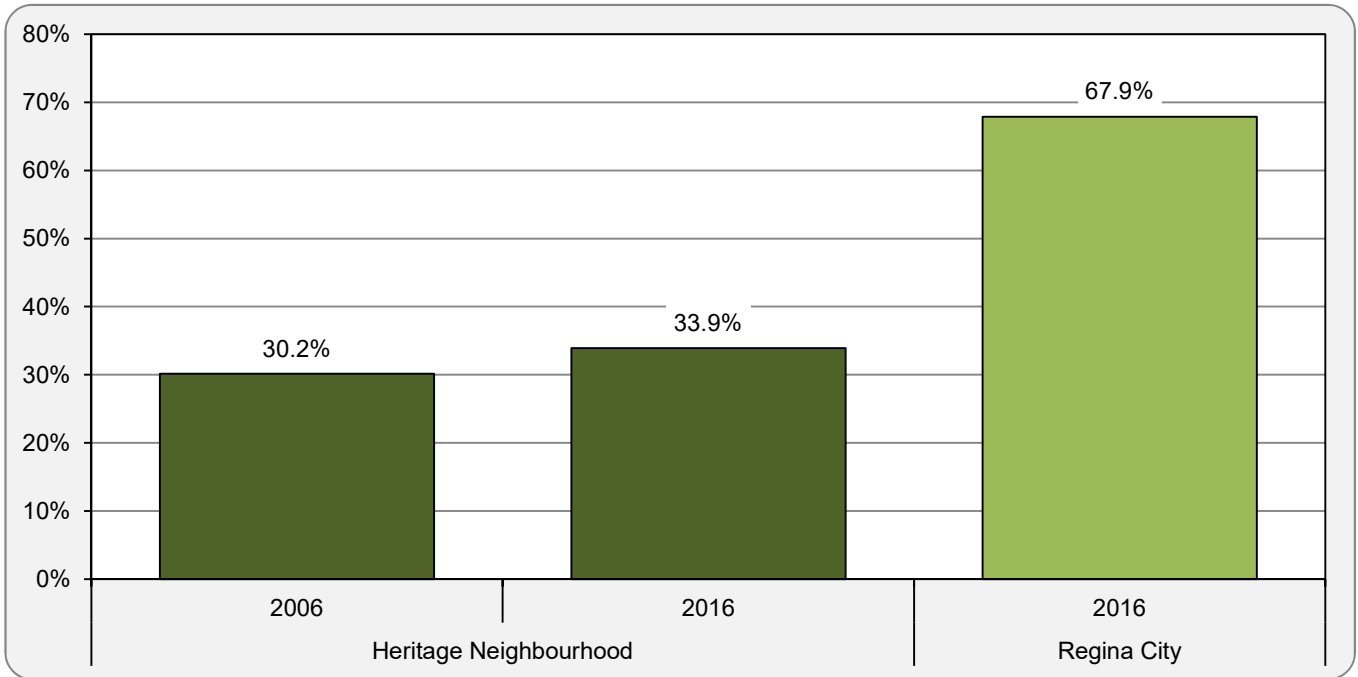

Figure 7: Multi-Family Households as Percentage of all Households



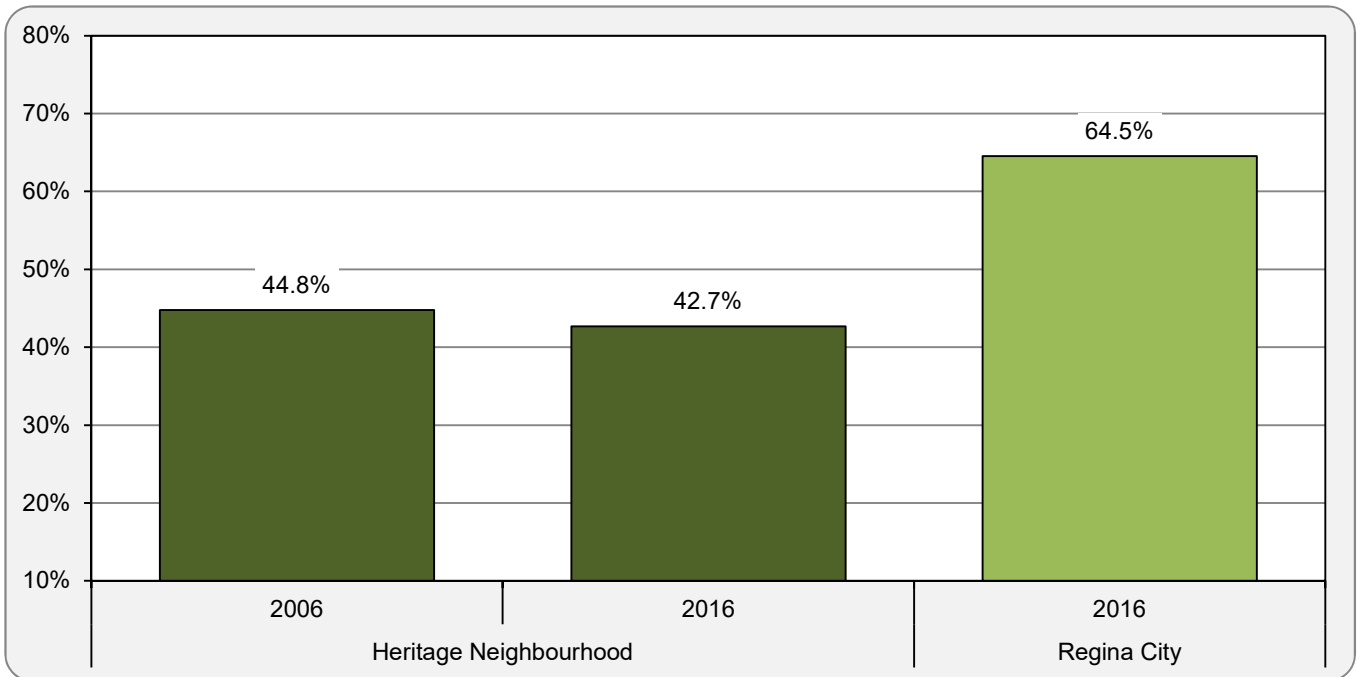

Figure 8: Percentage of Persons in Same Dwelling as Five Years Ago



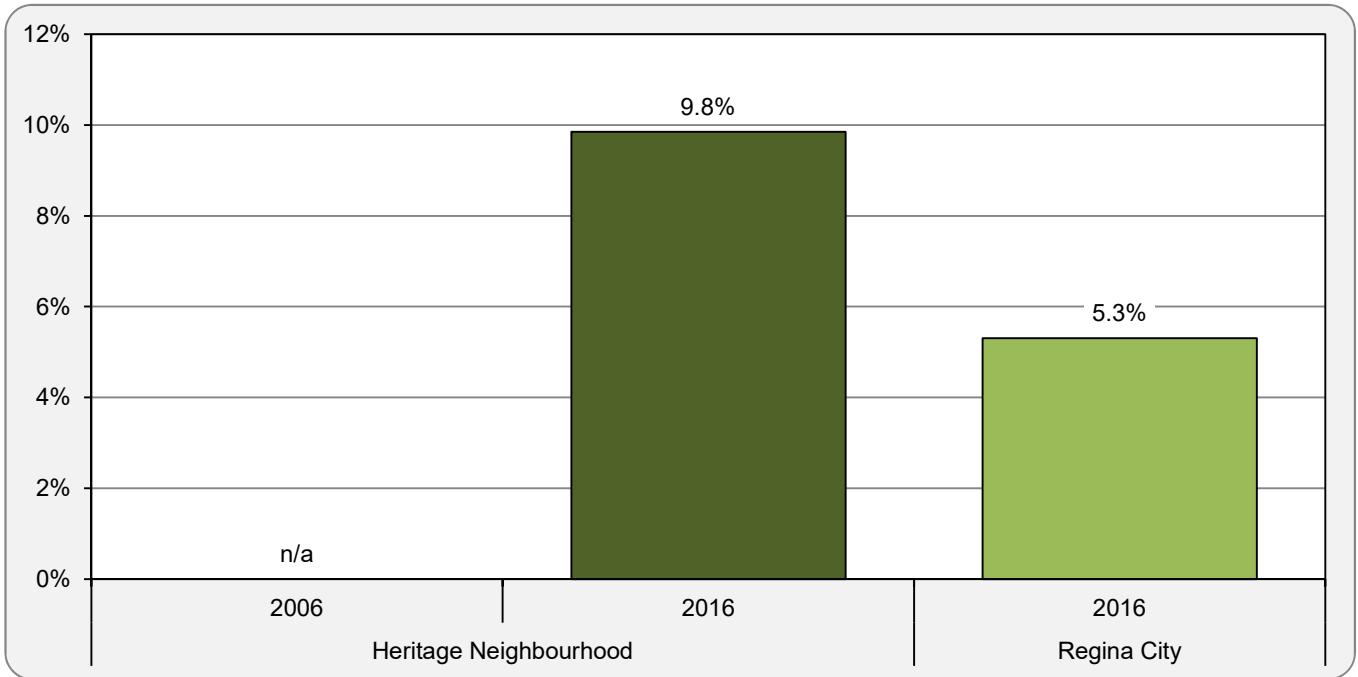

Figure 9: Percentage of Dwellings Owned by Occupants



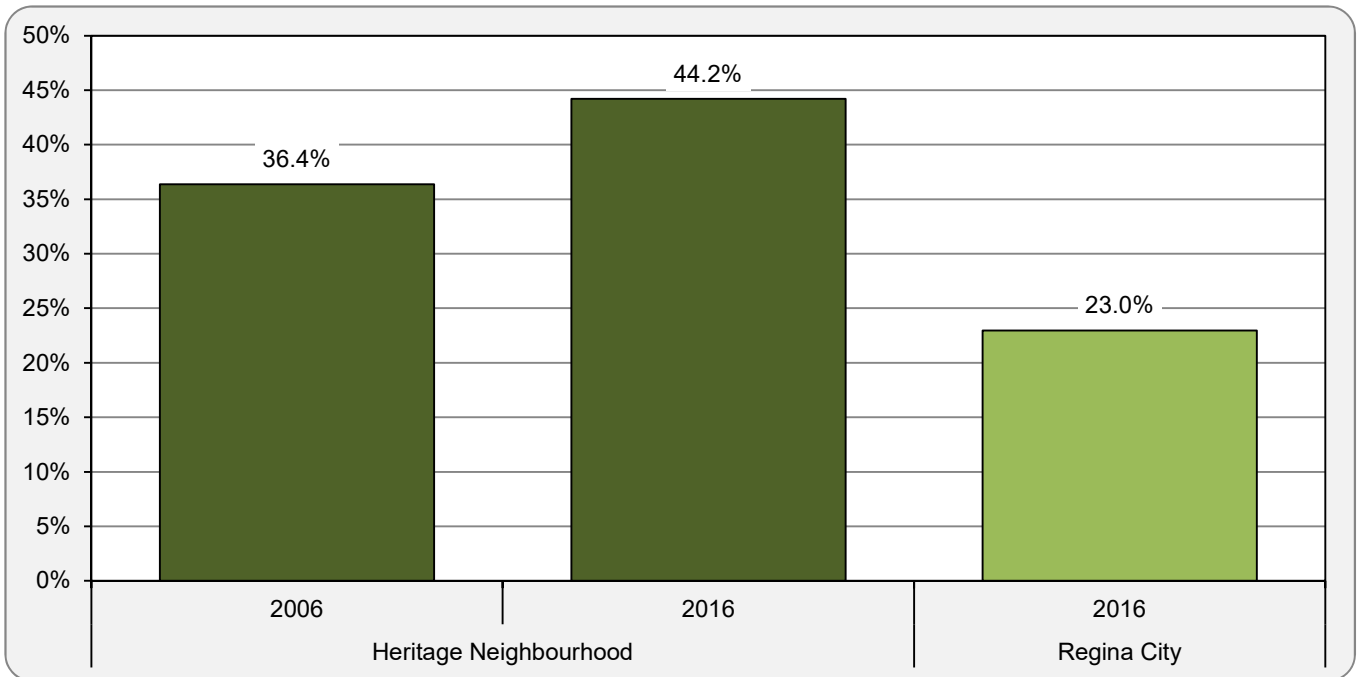

Figure 11: Percentage of Dwellings that are Crowded



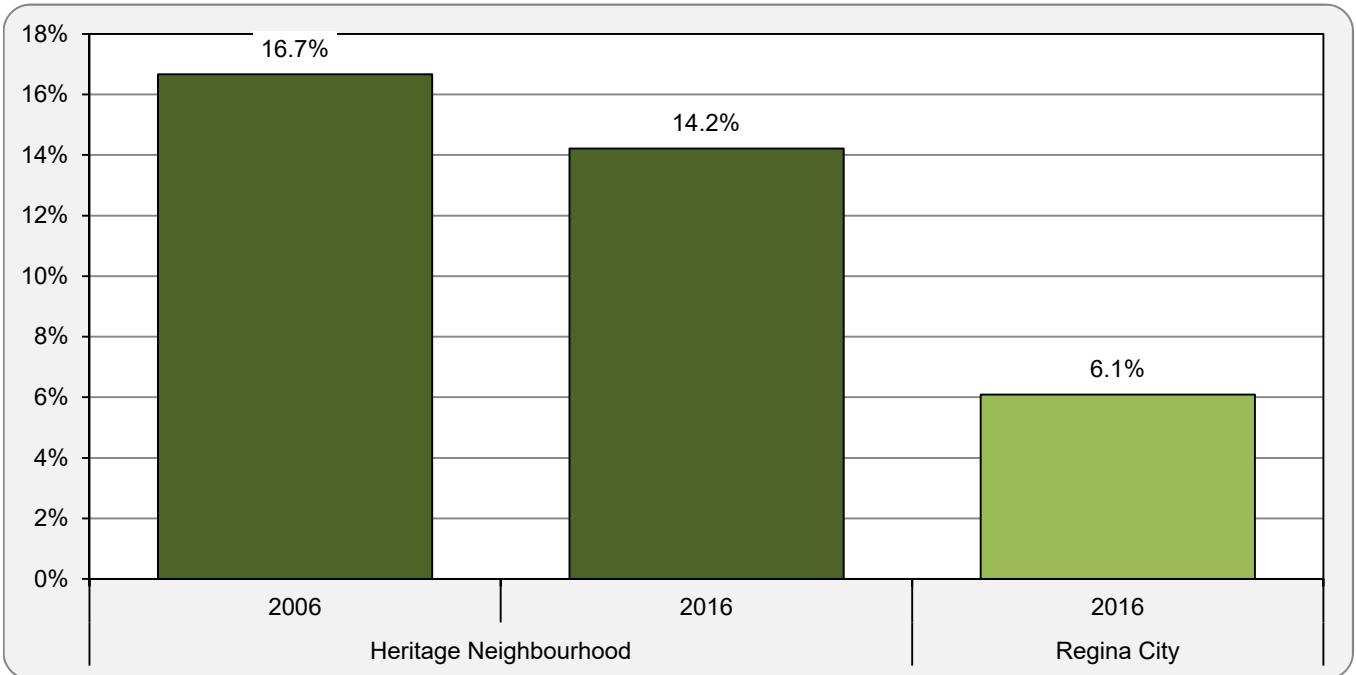

Figure 12: Percentage of Dwellings that are Unaffordable



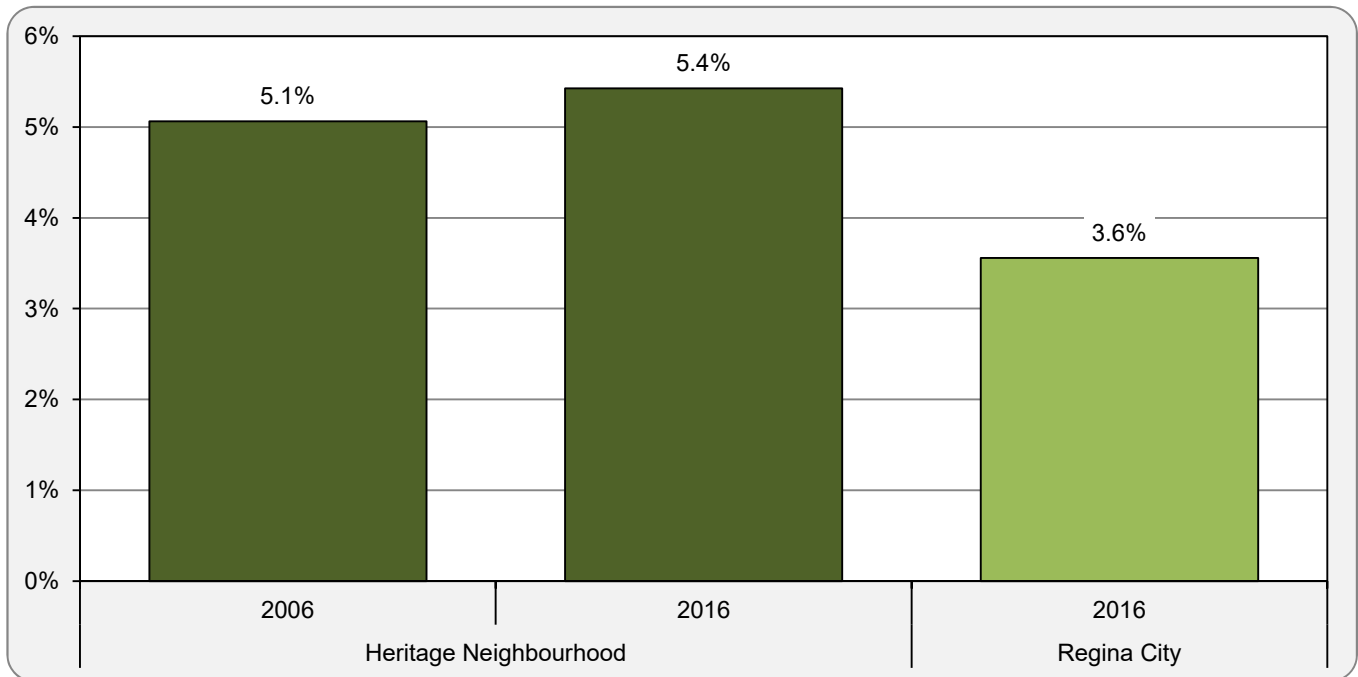

Figure 13: Percentage of Dwellings in Need of Major Repairs



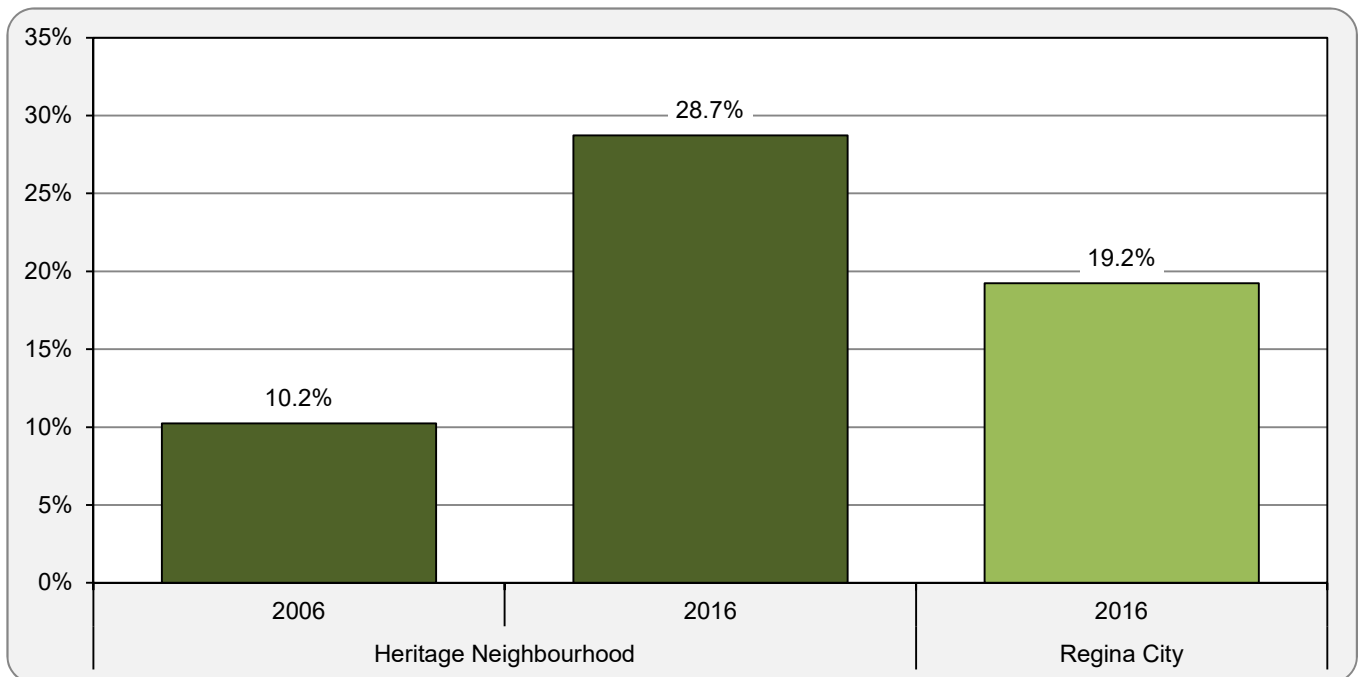

Figure 15: Percentage of Population with a Métis Identity

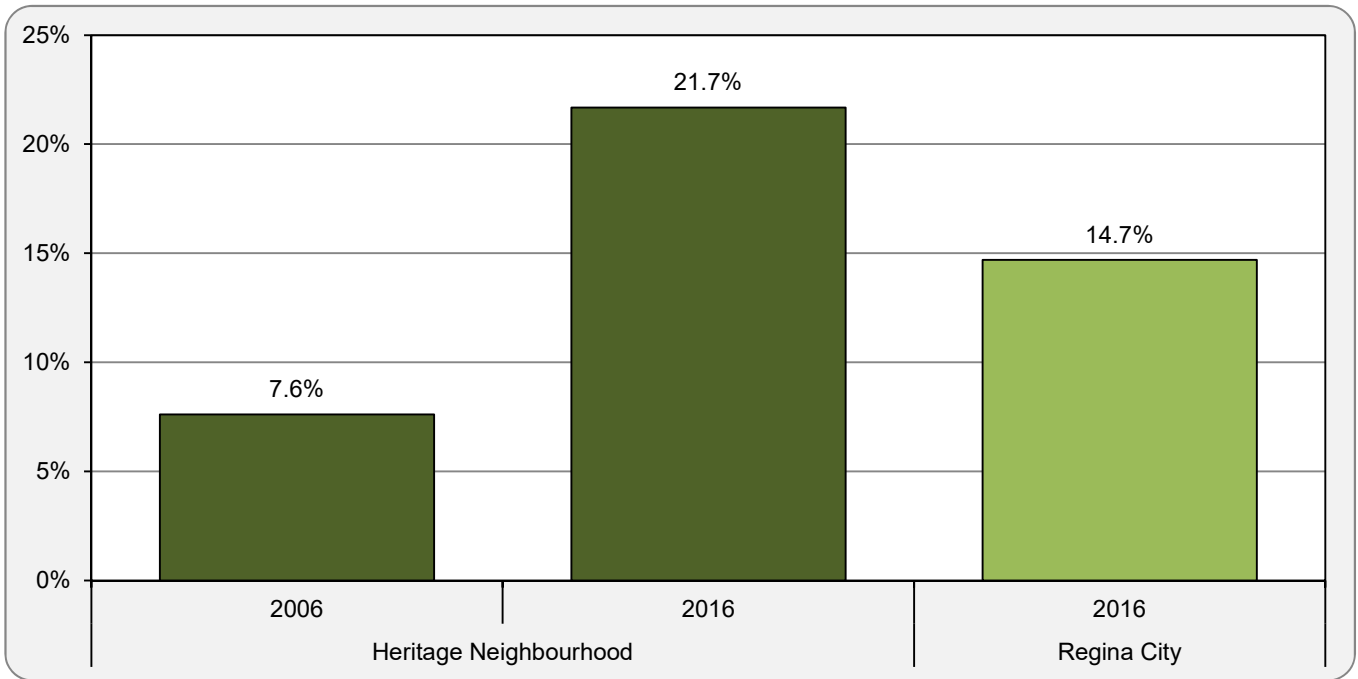

Figure 16: Percentage of Population who are Members of a Visible Minority Group



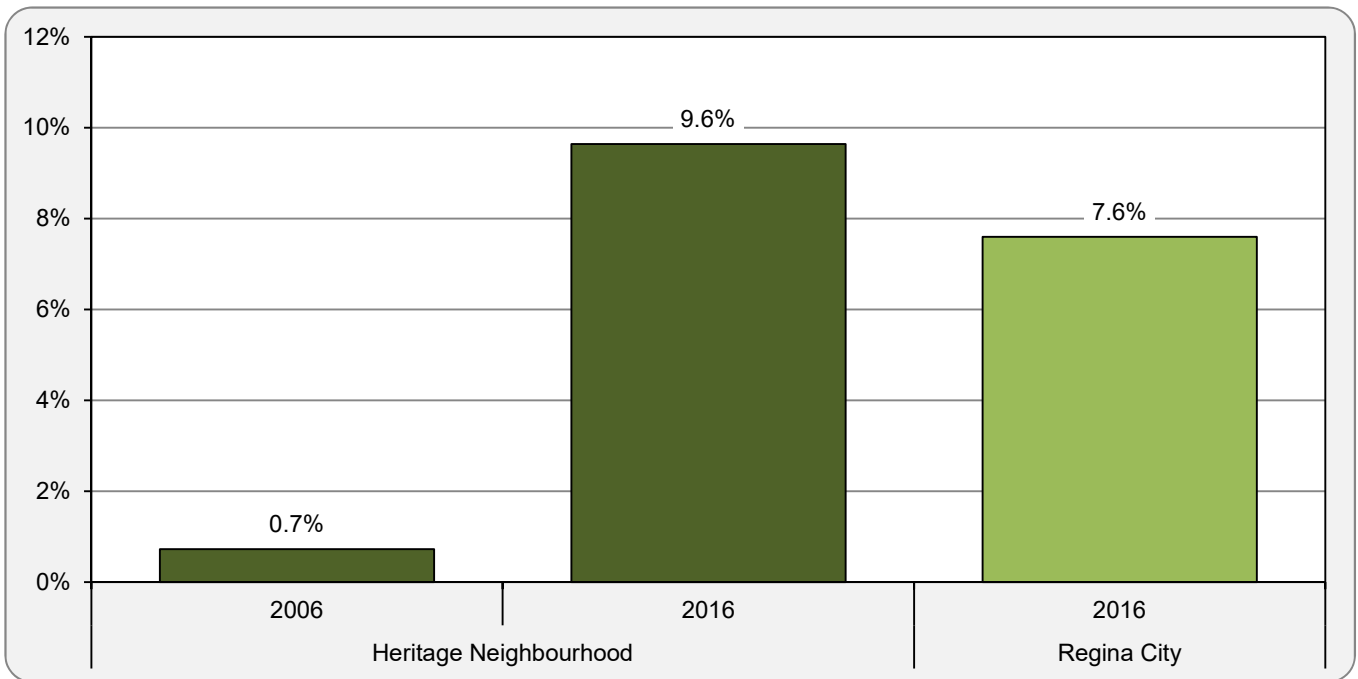

Figure 17: Percentage of Population with a Home Language other than English

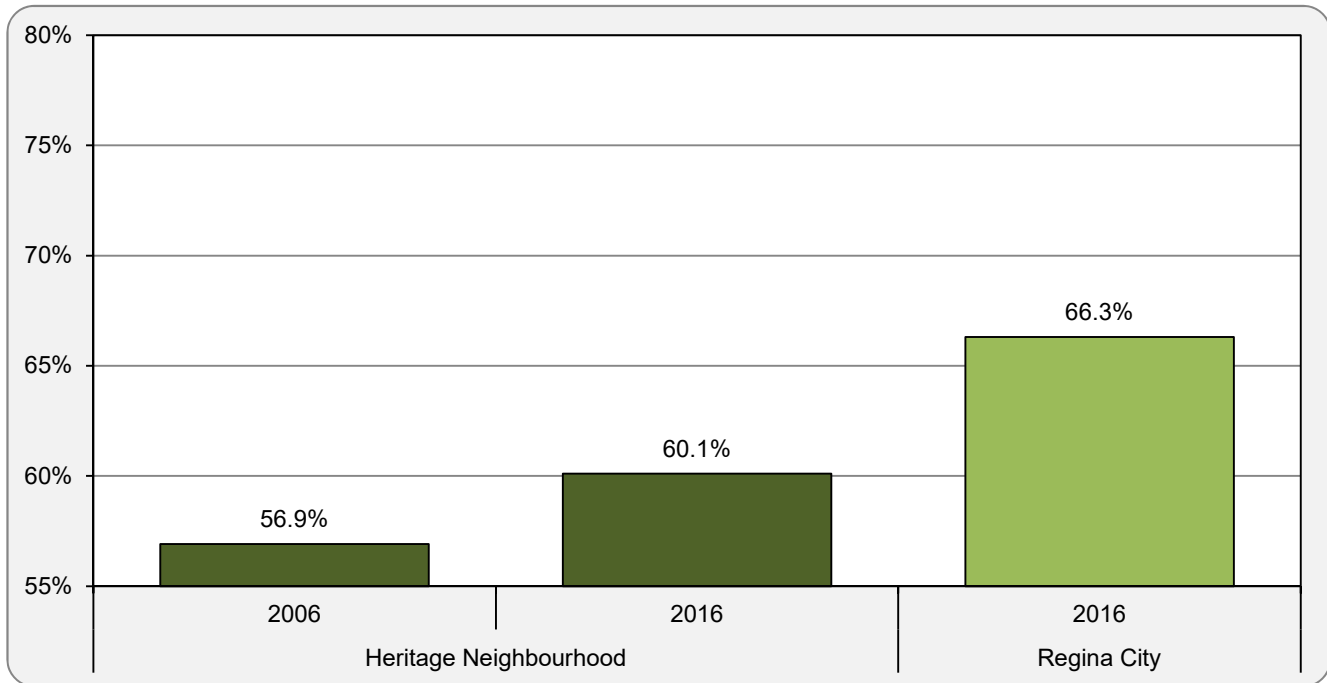

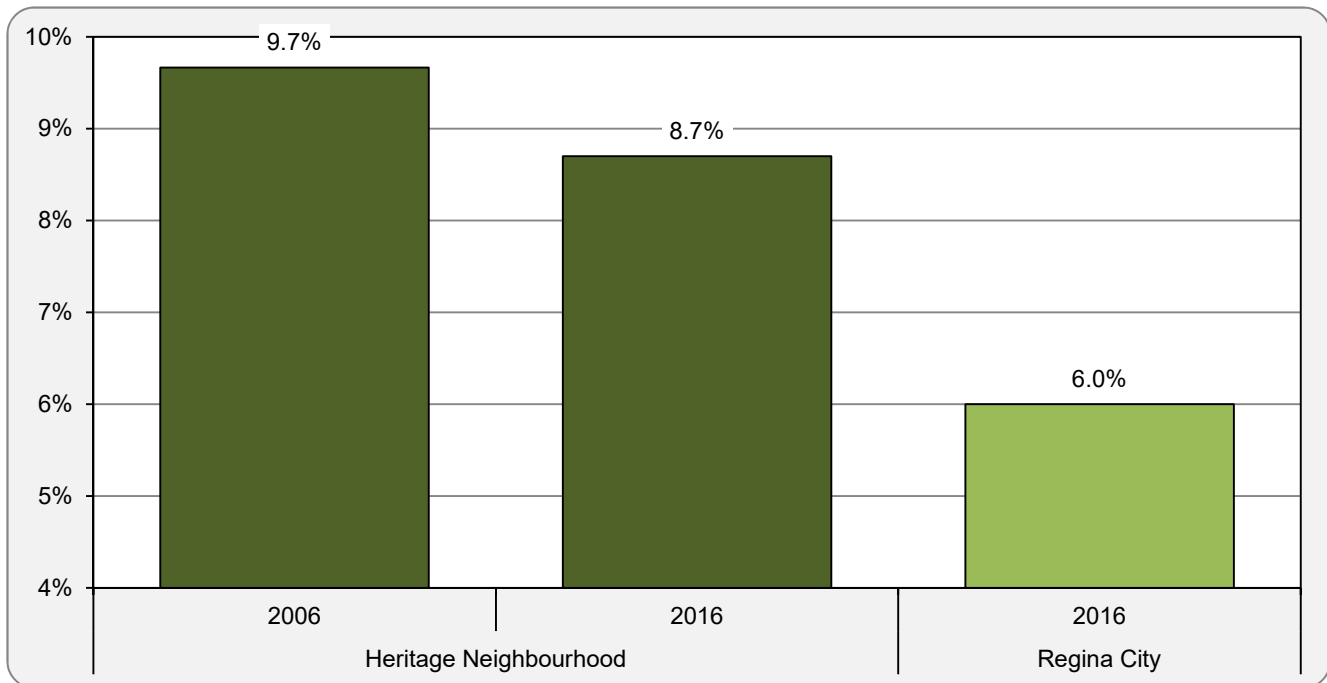
Figure 18: Percentage of Population who Immigrated to Canada in the Past Five Years

Figure 19: Percentage of Population 15 & Older Employed (Employment Rate)

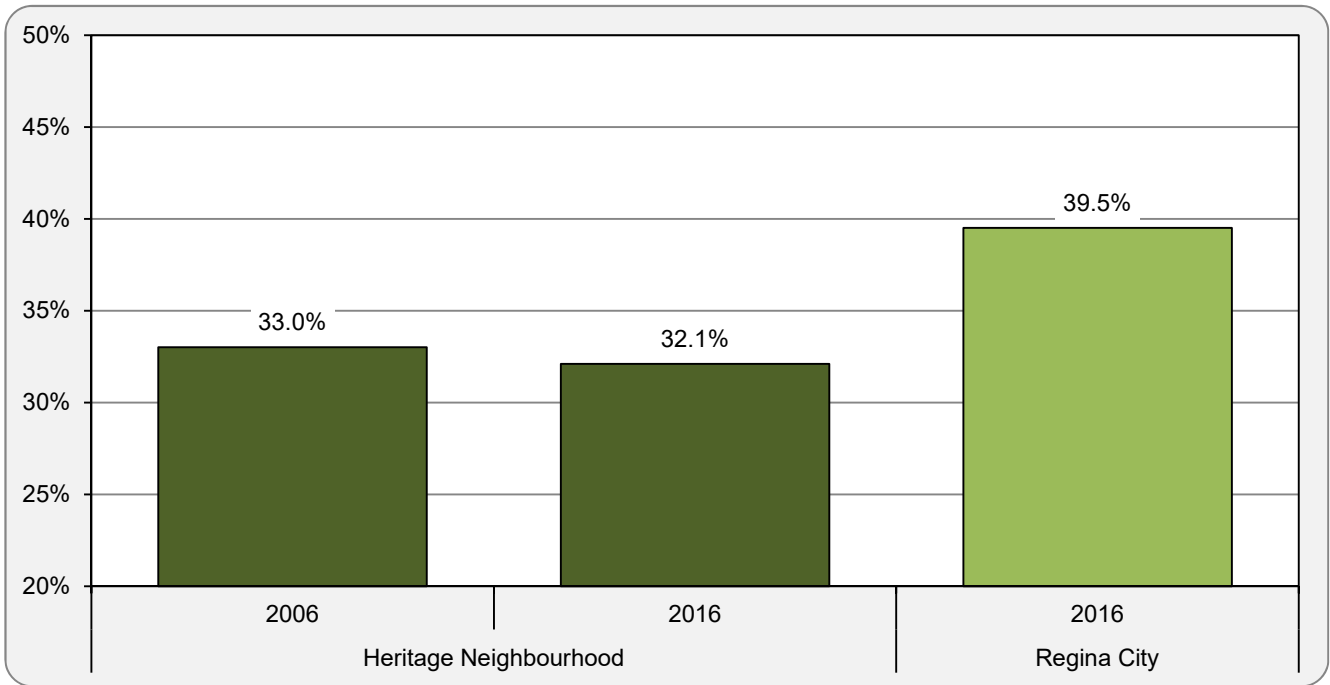

Figure 20: Unemployment Rate



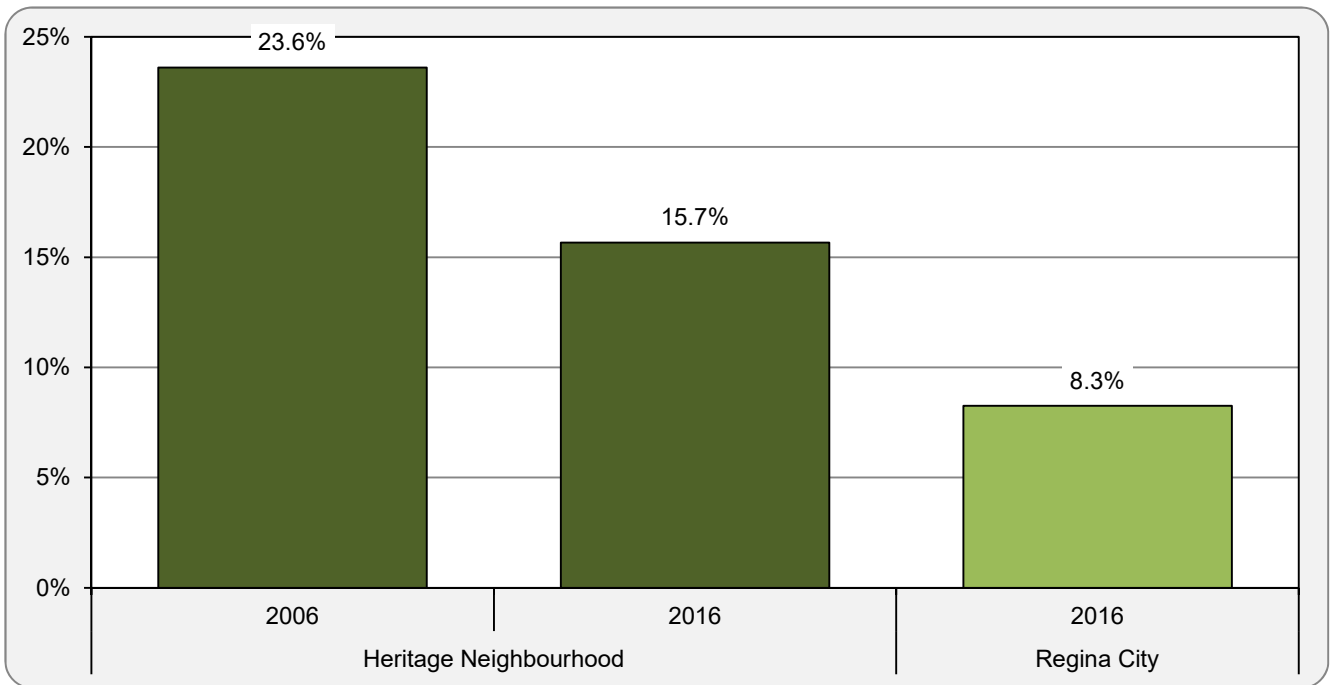

Figure 21: Population 15 & Older Employed Full-Time throughout the Previous Year

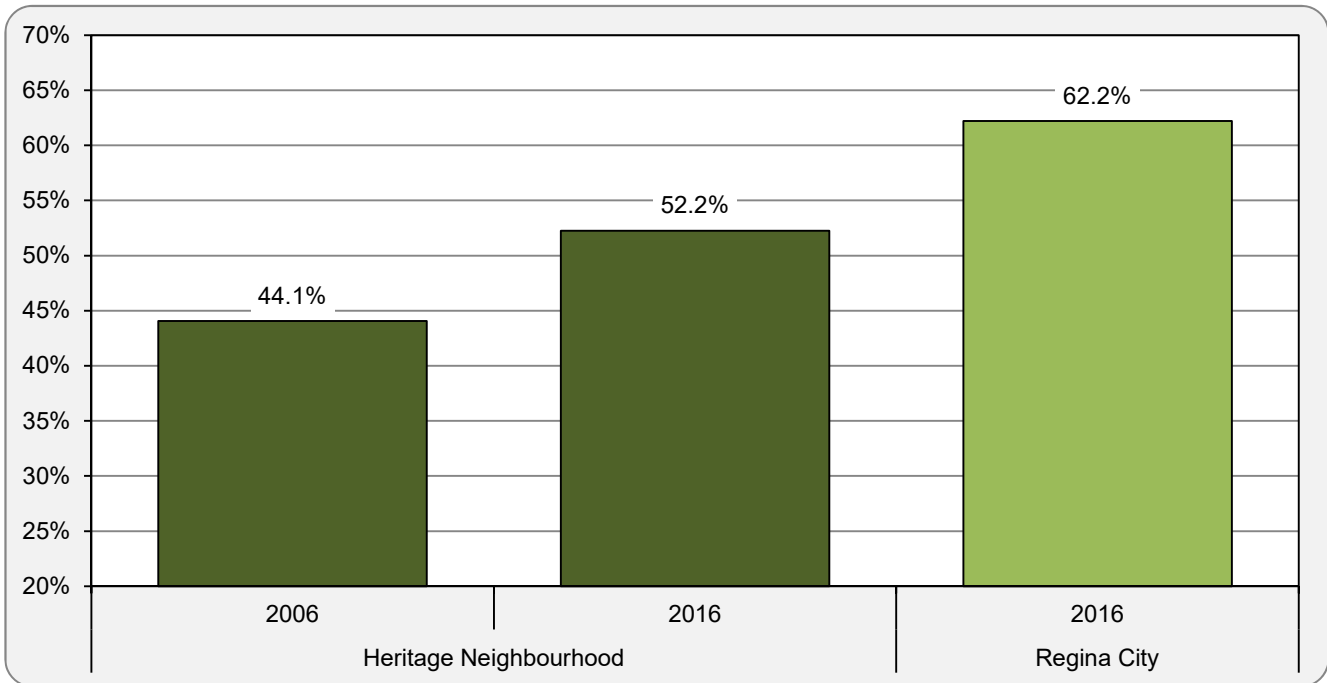

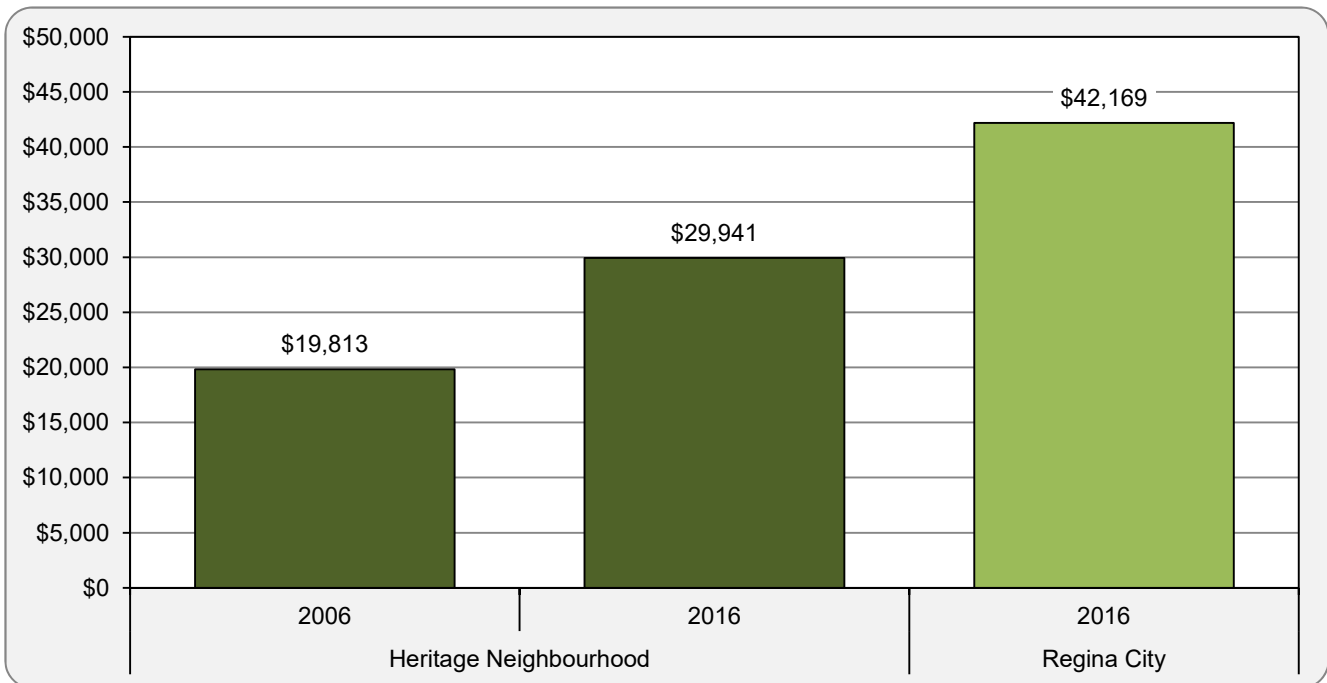
Figure 22: Population 25 to 64 Years without a High School Diploma



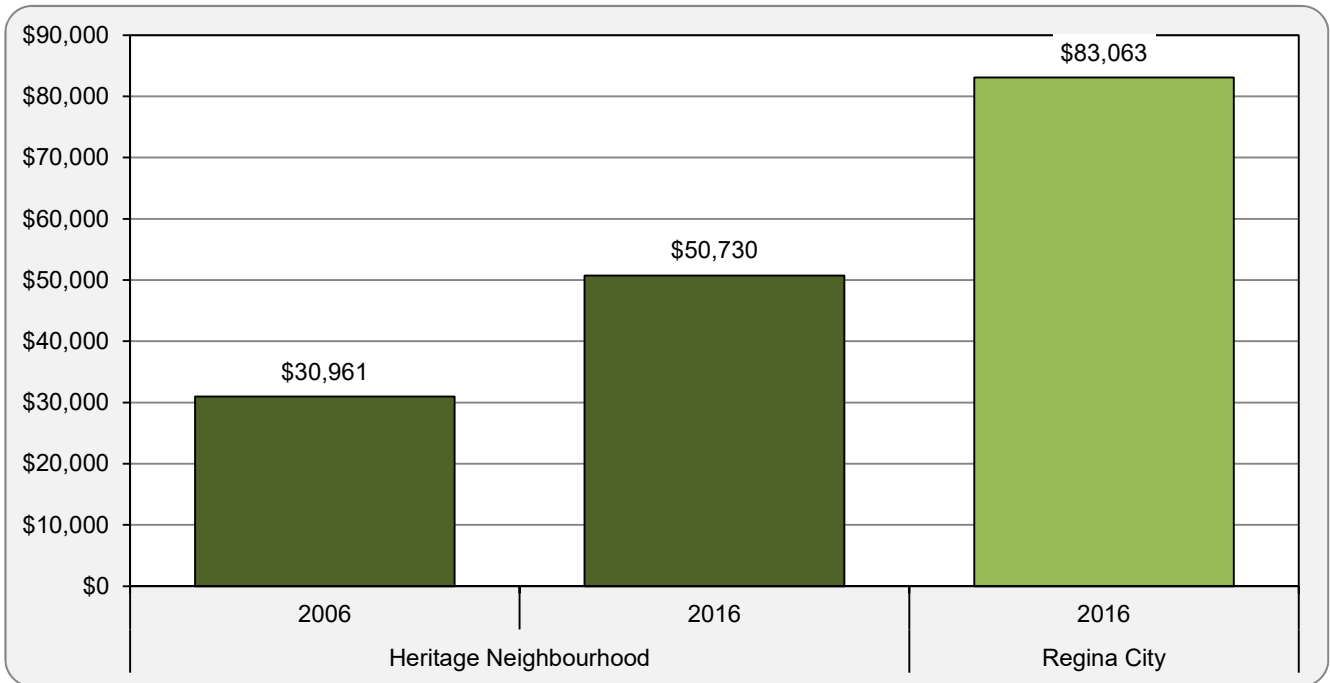

Figure 23: Population 25 to 64 Years who are Post-Secondary Graduates



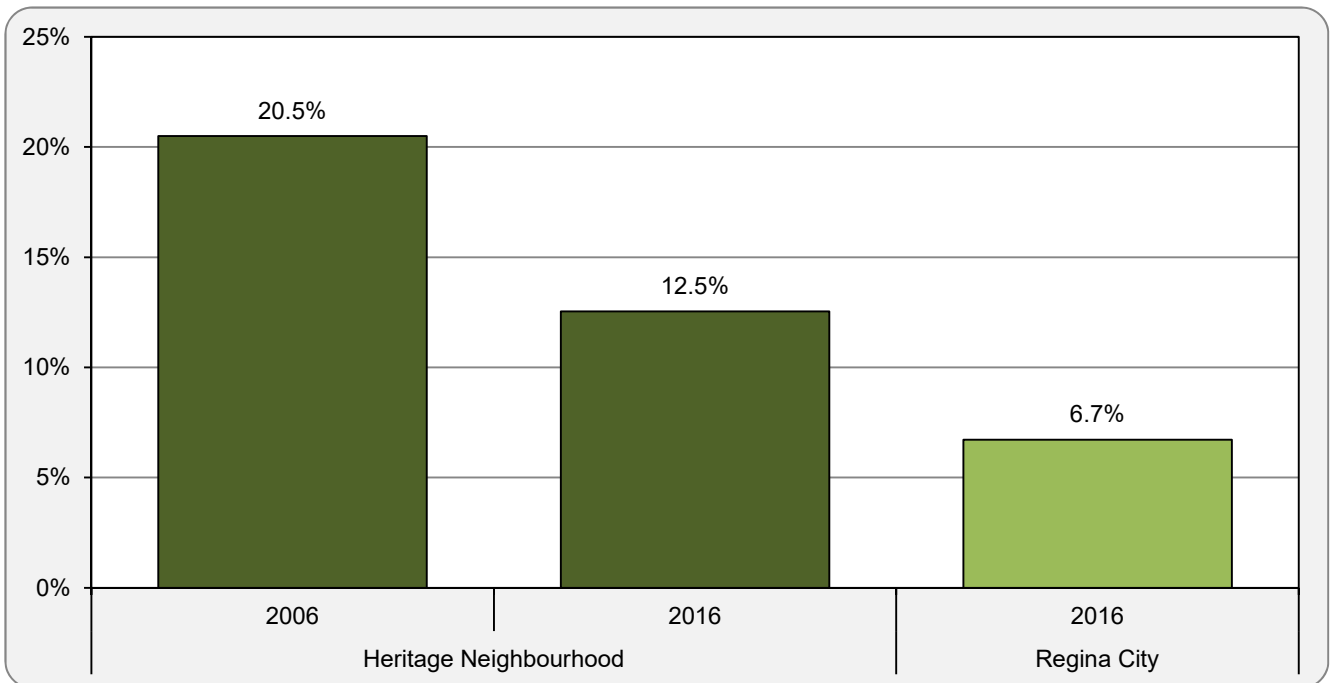

Figure 24: Average Income After Taxes, Population 15 and Older



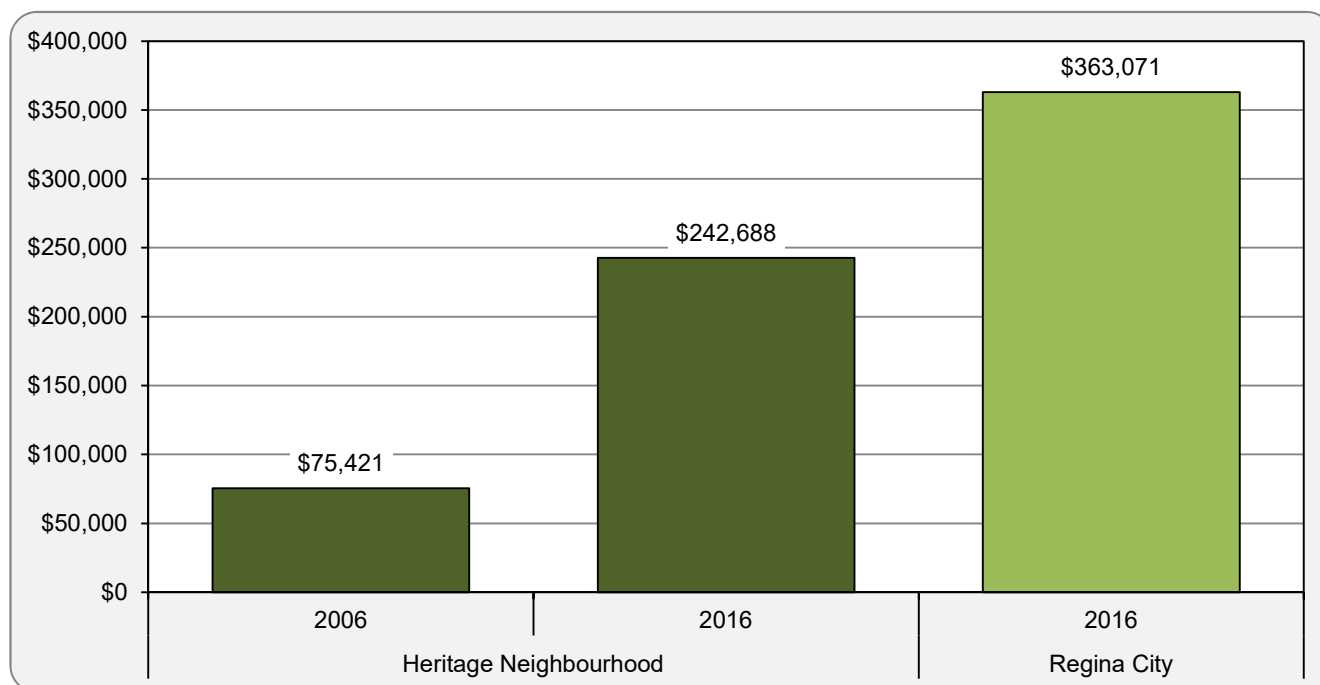

Notes:

- Figures 1 to 4* *The population includes those "normally" resident in the community. It excludes those who are in collective dwellings such as special care homes, hotels, or senior's residences.*
- Figures 5 through 13* *Households include single-detached dwellings, duplexes, basement suites (if they have a separate entrance), and apartments.*
- Figure 11* *Crowded dwellings are those that do not have a sufficient number of bedrooms for the residents, taking into account their age and sex.*
- Figure 12* *Unaffordable dwellings are those where the occupant spends more than 30% of the gross household income on shelter costs.*
- Figure 13* *This is based on the opinion of the occupant.*
- Figures 14, 15, and 16* *Aboriginal identity and membership in a visible minority group is based on self-declared questions.*
- Figure 26* *Low incomes used the Low Income After Tax (LICO-AT) measure. It refers to an income where the household spends a large share of their after-tax income on the necessities of food, shelter and clothing.*
